Voter Outcomes

For version 1

There should be 8 of Outcome 1

For version 2

Except for the ones listed below, 1 outcome for every 36 students.

There should be 8 of Outcome 1

1. Congratulations. You were able to vote.
2. Your child is sick and you can't find anyone to take care of them. You were unable to vote
3. You couldn't find anyone to stay with the very sick parent that you take care of. You were unable to vote.
4. You worked all day & one of your children complains of nausea as you pick them up at school. It's raining & you feel it's too much of a hassle to get out in the rain with a sick kid. You don't vote.
5. You worked all day & had to get your child to a basketball game right after work. The game lasts until after polls close. You were unable to vote.
6. You were scheduled for work right after classes & you worked until after the polls closed. You were unable to vote.
7. You work in a more urban area, but live in a neighboring rural county, roughly an hour away. You have to leave for work before the polls open & you do not get home until they have closed. You were unable to vote.
8. You worked all day & had an early evening class right after work. The class lasts until after polls close. You were unable to vote.
9. You have worked all day & have an online exam due at midnight on election day. The line to vote is easily over an hour long. You decide you'd rather make sure your exam is done, so you don't vote.
10. You had a rough day at and now it's raining as you pick your kids from after school care.

You're just tired of the day. You cannot muster the energy to get out in the rain, keep your kids in control, & vote.

11. After doing research on the candidates, you don't really see all that much difference between them and decide it's not worth the effort to vote.

12. Your name was erroneously purged from voting rolls because you have the same name as a felon. You were not notified of the purge and are unable to vote.

13. Your name was erroneously purged from voting rolls because you have the same name as an undocumented person. You were not notified of the purge and are unable to vote.

14. You have moved since you received your Driver's License, therefore the address on it is different than the address you put on the voter registration form years ago. You are given a provisional ballot, which will only be counted if you can go to the Supervisor of Elections office (SOE) during business hours within 48 hours of the election's end. You are able to find the time to do this. Your vote is counted.

15. You have moved since you received your Driver's License, therefore the address on it is different than the address you put on the voter registration form years ago. You are given a provisional ballot, which will only be counted if you can go to the Supervisor of Elections office (SOE) during business hours within 48 hours of the election's end. You are unable to find the time to do this because of an unexpected errand. Your vote is not counted.

16. While you registered successfully, you did not register within 30 days of the election, therefore you cannot vote.

17. While you registered successfully, you registered with no party affiliation or as a member of a party that is not holding a primary election, therefore you cannot vote.

18. Although there is a bus line near your house, you don't feel it's worth the expense of bus fare to vote. You do not vote and are unable to vote.

19. You have no car & there is no public transportation to use. You were unable to vote.

20. Your car died & you do not live near public transportation. You were unable to vote.

21. Your work hours conflict with hours that the Driver's licensing agency is open and you cannot afford to take time off, so you have no photo ID. You are given a provisional ballot, which will only be counted if you can go to the Supervisor of Elections office (SOE) during business hours within 48 hours of the election's end. The same time conflicts that kept you from getting a photo ID also keep you from going to the SOE, so you cannot go to the SOE and prove your voter eligibility. Your vote will not count.

22. Your time is already stretched thin getting to work & school by relying on others for transportation. You didn't ask anyone to make the extra trip for you to get a photo ID. You are given a provisional ballot, which will only be counted if you can go to the Supervisor of Elections office (SOE) during business hours within 48 hours of the election's end. The same time conflicts that kept you from getting a photo ID also keep you from going to the SOE, so you cannot go to the SOE and prove your voter eligibility. Your vote will not count.

23. You have no photo ID, so you are given a provisional ballot, which will only be counted if you can go to the Supervisor of Elections office (SOE) during business hours within 48 hours of the election's end. You are able to make it to the SOE with a copy of a bill that shows you live at the address where you are registered to vote. Your Provisional Ballot counts.

24. You are still on probation for your felony, causing your application to have your voting rights restored to be denied. You cannot vote.

25. Between full time work & part time school you did not have time to complete the process of asking for your voting rights to be restored. You cannot vote.

26. Your application to have your voting rights restored was approved. You get to vote.

27. Your parents brought you to the US illegally as a toddler & you cannot establish that you are a US citizen. Your attempt to register to vote fails.
