COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a broad survey course designed to introduce students to the core theories, concepts, and historical events in international relations. The goal of this course is to provide students with the tools necessary to think about international relations with greater sophistication and to help students develop the skills to make sense of events happening in the world. The first segment of the course details the primary theoretical paradigms of world politics, the "levels of analysis" debate, and the actors in international relations. These concepts will then be applied to key events in world politics, beginning with the origins of the modern international system, following through the two World Wars, and ending with the Cold War and beyond. The second segment of the class will focus on critical issues of security, international law and organization, and global issues. We will also examine the current workings of the global economy and look at scenarios of the future.

We will discuss current events in class, thus I would recommend that you follow international news by regularly reading a reputable news source or watching a tv news channel/program.

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

I begin with the premise that each student enrolled in this course is highly intelligent and capable. As such, I have high expectations for both your academic commitment and personal behavior. You are responsible for your success in this course and the course is designed such that if you work hard you will do quite well.

1. Develop a theoretical understanding of the main approaches to studying international relations.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Discussion Forums

Students are required to do research and engage in a discussion with the class - a great place to test your ideas but please be kind and respectful to the opinions of others. This assignment is intended

to hone your skills as a responsible citizen, so that you can make an impact on our world and your local community.

You will be required to provide a Post (your own discussion) that appropriately and substantively answers the question prompt in the Module for that week. You are also required to provide two Replies on the posts of other students.

Directions on Completing the Discussion Forum

To provide your Post, click on my Discussion Forum Prompt: Please Reply to This Question. To provide your two Replies, simply choose which students to respond to and click reply button at the bottom of the student post.

NOTE: You will not see the posts of your peers until you post your response to my prompt. You must wait 15 minutes and then refresh the page (or click on the prompt) before you will see the responses.

Your Post must be long enough to thoroughly cover the discussion board prompts: <u>minimum</u> two paragraphs, with six to ten sentences each paragraph. This comes out to 100-word count <u>minimum</u> per paragraph for a total of 200-word count <u>minimum</u> for your Post. Discussion Posts will be marked down for falling below the 200-word count floor.

The Post must include substantive material from the book. Online sources cannot substitute for book material (except when indicated). You may use online sources to *augment* your comments, but not to replace book material.

Also, your Post must adequately answer the discussion board prompts. Students will lose points for failing to answer the question prompt, or for failing to answer all parts of the question prompt.

The deadline for your Post is always due before the deadline for the Replies. Please check the syllabus to verify when the Posts and Replies are due. Any Posts submitted after the deadline will not be graded.

The two Replies must be <u>minimum</u> one paragraph in length each, or about six to ten sentences in length. This comes out to a 100-word <u>minimum</u> count per Reply paragraph. Discussion Replies will be marked down for falling below the 100-word count floor.

Replies must be substantive and specific. Saying "good job" or "I agree", is not enough. Students must put some thought into their Replies.

DISCUSSION FORUM POST GRADING SCALE

A (10-9) Excellent Effort – You properly answered the question prompt appropriately and substantively. You had at minimum two paragraphs (200-word count) for the Post.

B (8-7) Adequate job - You mostly answered the question prompt. You barely meet the two-

paragraph (200-word count) minimum for the Post and/or include just enough substantive material from the book.

C (6-5) Average job – You somewhat answered the question prompt. You did not meet the twoparagraph (200-word count) minimum for the Post and/or somewhat include substantive material from the book.

D (4-3) Made an attempt – You barely answered the question prompt. You were far below the twoparagraph (200-word count) minimum for the Post and/or barely included substantive material from the book.

F (2-0) Either did not try or attempt is a failing, unacceptable effort – You failed to answer the question prompt appropriately and/or failed to include any substantive material from the book. Or you did not provide the Post by the deadline listed in the syllabus.

DISCUSSION FORUM RESPONSES GRADING SCALE

A (5-4) Excellent Effort – You substantively and specifically responded to the other student's Post and met the one-paragraph (100-word count) minimum.

C (3-2) Made an attempt – You somewhat responded to the other student's Post and/or did not meet the one-paragraph (100-word count) minimum

F (1-0) Either did not try or attempt is a failing, unacceptable effort

2. Global Governance Presentations

All students will sign up for group presentations at the beginning of the semester. The goal of these GG presentations is to engage students with contemporary IR issues through theoretical lens. Building on World101 interactive modules from Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), student groups will record a presentation on the issue they sign up for. One week before the presentation due date, the group will submit their presentation outline/slides and a list of discussion questions (3 unique questions per group member, cross-checked before submission) to the professor. Every group member is expected to contribute fairly, and peer evaluations will be conducted following each presentation. Expectations and requirements for the presentations are located in Cougar Courses

Discussion questions should be designed to get students to critically think about your presentation. When preparing the questions, ask yourself, how could students continue the conversation? What would you want them to think about now that they just saw your recorded presentation?

Students who are not presenting that week will pick two of the posted discussion questions to reply to. The replies to the posted discussion questions for each presentation are due date listed in the Syllabus. Please make sure to address both questions in one reply. This makes it easier for me to

see if you have completed the replies. Replies are considered part of your overall Global Governance Presentation grade. Every reply that is missing will count as negative three points of the 150 points total for the assignment.

Finally, the Global Governance Presentations and their accompanying discussion questions will be included in Examination #2 and the Final Examination in the short answer questions.

3. Levels of Analysis Paper

The major writing assignment for this class is a **seven-page research paper** that describes an event in world politics and applies one level of analysis to that event. Your goal in this paper is to use the level that you feel best explains your event/action and explain why. This is not a history of the event; it is an analysis of the reasons why the event occurred. <u>Expectations and paper requirements are located in Cougar Courses.</u>

There are numerous events in the textbook to help you choose a topic. If you need assistance, please see me. You must use scholarly sources and proper citations and include a bibliography. Grammar and spelling do count, so please spell check, and seek assistance with your writing if necessary. I am more than willing to help you.

Format Criteria for Levels of Analysis Paper:

A. Length: Minimum seven substantive & complete pages

Note: The title page and any works cited page do NOT count as a substantive page. Substantive pages are written pages. In addition, a complete page means that the entire page has been used.

Note: If you fail to complete the minimum required substantive & complete pages you will be penalized. Students will lose **10%** for every substantive page that student fails to complete.

B. Documentation: **Avoid long direct quotations.** Instead, you should paraphrase the author(s) and provide a page number in parenthesis. When paraphrasing the author(s) from the text, make it clear "who" is speaking, and follow with a page reference as above, for example:

According to Pete Wilson, former Governor of California, Brown was the consummate politician (317).

C. All papers must be submitted through Cougar Courses by the deadline listed in the Course Outline below.

D. All papers must have a title page attached to the front of each policy brief with the following information: Title of Paper; Student's Name; Date of Submitting the Paper; PSCI 350; and instructor's name.

E. The entire paper needs to be double-spaced.

F. Margin requirements: 1 inch on the left, right, top, and bottom (These are the default margins in Microsoft Word.)

G. All pages except the title page should have page numbers in the lower right-hand corner of the page.

H. Times New Roman font only and 12 size fonts only. (Use of other fonts or sizes is strictly prohibited.)

4. Class Examinations (Must be taken with the Respondus LockDown Browser). There will be three examinations in this class. Each examination will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions, 5 short answer questions, and two essay questions chosen at random. A study guide will be provided ahead of each examination with a list of possible essay question prompts for student preparation.

Examination #1 will cover the first third of the Semester: Chapters One through Four in the Mingst, et al. textbook, the corresponding power points, and the recorded lectures.

Examination #2 will cover the second third of the Semester: Chapters Five through Eight in Mingst, et al. textbook, the corresponding power points, the student presentations, and the recorded lectures.

The Final Examination will cover the final third of the Semester: Chapters Nine through Eleven in the Mingst, et al. textbook, the additional lecture on Global Governance in the Pandemic, the corresponding power points, the student presentations, and the recorded lectures.
